



## Staffing & Funding

#### **Staffing includes 3 FTEs**

- FIMR Coordinator: Program oversight and management
- Health Information Technician: Case abstraction
- Community Clinical Counselor: Family interviews

#### Funding

- Amount: \$36,875

### **Common Themes**

FIMR Case Review Team Findings - 2021 Report

- Enroll more high-risk pregnant people in perinatal home visiting services to help them get and stay involved in care.
- Adequately assess patients' non-medical needs to underscore the fact that pregnancy is not just a medical condition.
- Eliminate barriers to prenatal care, including transportation, lack of insurance and difficulty scheduling appointments.
- Address patient trauma and mental health before, during and after pregnancy.

### Recommendations

- Fetal Infant Mortality Review funding
- Simplified Medicaid enrollment
- Home visiting
- Prevent homelessness during pregnancy and postpartum
